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THE FIRST EPISTLE OF JOHN

In addition to the epistles bearing his name, the apostle John also wrote the Gospel of John and the Book of Revelation. He is referred to as "the disciple whom Jesus loved." John preached and lived the message of love, and it is the central theme of this epistle.

CHAPTER 1 - READ THE CHAPTER FIRST

The eleven apostles, who had personally lived and walked with the Lord Jesus during His earthly ministry, formed the basic core of authority for the early church. However, all of them at various times were challenged and their authority questioned.

In the first three verses, John refers to his personal experience with Jesus, which was the foundation of his ministry. Although we have not seen Jesus in the flesh, our foundation and authority rest on a similar experience. How close are we to Him? Do we hear His voice? Are we in touch with Him? Have we seen His glory? One who has personally experienced the presence of the Lord is a Christian who can teach others!

CHAPTER 2 - READ THE CHAPTER FIRST

1. It is not the nature of those serving Christ Jesus to sin; but if any man does sin, what does he have? v. 1 we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous:

An advocate is a lawyer or someone who defends you. In verse 2, Jesus is called the "propitiation" for our sins, or the one who has taken our sins away.

2. According to verse 2, for whom did Jesus die? <u>for the sins of the whole world</u>.

After we are saved we are more aware of sin. We find that we **want** to be pleasing to God. Through the power of the Holy Spirit, we can obey God.

- 3. How can we be sure that we really know the Lord? v. 3 ______ if we keep his commandments.
- 4. What does verse 4 state about those who say, "I know the Lord," yet do not obey Him? He is a liar, and the truth is not in him.

If we say we are living in Christ, our life should be like His. (v. 6) This is a high goal, but verse 5 reveals we can be perfected if we keep His word.

This epistle has very clear and practical teaching on the greatest of all qualities in life--LOVE. Verse 7 says that the command to love one another is no new teaching. It has been taught as long as God has been speaking to man.

John addresses three groups of people in verses 12-14: fathers, young men, and little children. By this he tells us that love is the first commandment regardless of our age.

The rest of the chapter is about false teachers. All false teachers are antichrists! (v. 18) However, one great false teacher, the Antichrist, will arise in the last days.

Verse 24 tells us not to forsake the simple message of salvation we heard when we first received Jesus Christ. Read II Corinthians 11:3.

18. What promise do we have if we steadfastly hold to the true gospel message? v. 25 even eternal life.

Verse 27 does not mean we do not need teachers, but rather that no "man" teaches us. When a person is anointed by the Holy Spirit, it is not he who teaches but the Lord who teaches through him.

- 20. What does this anointing do for you? v. 27 ______ teacheth me of all things, and is truth, and is no lie, and even as it hath taught me I shall abide in him.

CHAPTER 3 - READ THE CHAPTER FIRST

- 1. What shows us the great love of God? v. 1 _____ that we should be called the sons of God

- 4. As we keep this hope of His return in our hearts, what will it do in our lives? v. 3 purifieth ourselves, even as he is pure.

Beginning in verse 4, we return to the theme of this book--love. John begins by talking about sin and then points out that not loving the brethren is a sin.

Verses 6 and 9 do not mean that we never sin again after we are saved. The real meaning here is that if we are saved we will not **continue** to practice sin.

The world may talk about peace and brotherhood, but never before has there been **less** peace and brotherhood. Even though all men know the message of love is true, without God man is not capable of real love.

When sin entered into men's hearts, real love was pushed out. Even the first human family experienced hatred and murder, and it is no different today.

People who say they are saved and yet have no desire to be in church and fellowship with their brethren should examine their hearts and make sure they have truly passed from death unto life.

CHAPTER 4 - READ THE CHAPTER FIRST

Besides the teaching on love, a second theme runs throughout this epistle: false teachers. Although these two subjects seem unrelated, they are actually different aspects of the same teaching. The real foundation of a true ministry is love. One who teaches false doctrine clearly proves he does not love the ones he is teaching. If he really loves the Lord and God's people, he will take great care to make sure he is properly feeding the sheep.

CHAPTER 5 - READ THE CHAPTER FIRST

Chapter 4 established the principle that loving God and loving the brethren are inseparable. Loving the brethren is one way to prove our love for God. In chapter 5 we are told that we know we love the brethren by obedience to God. (v. 2)

When we are born again, we find that the world around us is opposed to God and the life of a Christian. The world system is based upon the pleasures of sin and the pursuit of material gain. The spirit of the world constantly seeks to weaken and distract Christians.

The New Testament was originally written in the Greek language. The word believe in Greek is a very strong word. It means to cling to and rely upon something with your whole life!

The Spirit testifies on earth because **now** the Holy Spirit dwells in us and gives us the ability to discern truth. In order to really **know** the truth of the Gospel, we receive the witness of God in our hearts. (v. 9)

Verses 16 and 17 plainly declare that there is a sin unto death. This does not mean we have to fear committing some sin that cannot be forgiven. As long as we want forgiveness, we can have it! Read I John 1:9 again.

THE SECOND EPISTLE OF JOHN

This letter is addressed to the "elect lady and her children". The content and flow of this short epistle is similar to I John.

THE THIRD EPISTLE OF JOHN

John's third letter is written to Gaius, a beloved brother in the Lord, encouraging him to continue his hospitality. This short letter gives insight into the importance of being led by the Holy Spirit.

- 1. In verse 2, John wishes Gaius to succeed in his labors and be healthy in proportion to. even as thy soul prospereth.

We can be sure that this "walk of truth" is also what pleases and rejoices the heart of God.

Gaius was walking in truth, but in the next three verses we are told of Diotrephes who was not submitting to authority and was guilty of slander.

- 5. Why wouldn't Diotrephes receive or accept what John wrote to the church? v. 9 who loveth to have the preeminence among them, receiveth us not.

According to verse 10, what three things was Diotrephes doing against other Christians?

Before John closes this letter, he speaks of a good Christian brother, Demetrius.

We too trust that **shortly** we will be able to see **all** the brethren face to face, and most of all, our Savior.

THE EPISTLE OF JUDE

Although there are other men named Jude in the New Testament, it is generally accepted that the Epistle of Jude was written by the brother of the Lord Jesus. (Read Mark 6:3 and Matthew 13:54,55.) Even Jesus' brother, who grew up with Him and saw Him every day, accepted and proclaimed Him as Savior.

This short epistle is the most intense teaching on false teachers and false brethren. Jude has a strict warning for us in verse 5. Many Jews whom the Lord saved out of Egypt were later destroyed for denying the faith.

Verses 8-21 deal with the wicked men who had crept in unawares and were destroying the unity and purity of the body. One of Satan's chief tools of destruction are these wolves in sheep's clothing who enter into the flock with their damnable heresies.

Many times deceivers are themselves deceived and lost in the "filthy dream" of their own importance.

In verse 9 Jude tells us that it must be the **Lord** who stops these false teachers. Even Michael, the archangel of God, did not try to face the devil in his own strength.
