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THE GOSPEL ACCORDING TO LUKE

PART I (Chapters 1 - 12)

INTRODUCTION

The author of the third gospel is identified as Luke. (Luke 1:3, Acts 1:1) He was known by the apostle Paul and the brethren at Colosse as the beloved physician. (Colossians 4:14) He is only mentioned by name two times in the New Testament. Both times he is in Paul's company during the apostle's imprisonment. (Col. 4:14 and II Tim. 4:11)

Luke is also the author of the book of Acts, his second treatise. (Acts 1:1) Both written works were addressed to Theophilus (beloved or lover of God) apparently in order to further convince Theophilus that the message of the Gospel was true and/or to deepen and strengthen his personal faith in Jesus Christ. i.e., Luke 1:4 Theophilus may have been a person of rank or prominence as the title "most excellent Theophilus" would indicate. The value of Luke's efforts are highlighted by the fact that the volume of his two works, the Gospel of Luke and Acts, account for about one quarter of the New Testament.

His introduction, Luke 1:1-4, indicates several items of importance to the reader. He acknowledges that his is not the only written account of the events of those early days of the ministry of Jesus Christ. He also acknowledges his personal state of faith by identifying himself as a believer. In verse 2 he indicates that the events recorded by him were firsthand eyewitness accounts, thus adding to their weight of evidence. However, II Timothy 3:16 tells us the true source of all scripture; it is given by inspiration of God.

Luke's second treatise, the Acts of the Apostles, no doubt is also the result of the same precise and detailed authentication. Beginning with Acts, his narrative becomes his own personal eyewitness account indicated by the introduction of the personal pronoun "we".

Due to lack of additional biblical information, other descriptions of the person Luke, whether accurate or not, must be relegated to the area of speculation.

As you study his account of the ministry of Jesus Christ, enjoy Doctor Luke's special insights and attention to details, knowing that truly you are studying the word of God.

CHAPTER 1 - READ THE CHAPTER FIRST

1. Even though Luke was not physically present with the apostles when the events in the life and ministry of Jesus took place, what is the source of the information that Luke is about to record? v. 2 Even as they delivered them unto us, which from the beginning were eyewitnesses, and ministers of the word. In verse one there are references to other gospels. So his sources were the eye witness accounts of others, and the Holy Ghost.

2. Luke purposed in his heart to research and document his record of the gospel to the best of his ability. However, he did not depend on human resources. According to II Timothy 3:16, what is the source of all scripture? All scripture is given by inspiration of God
3. What was the dilemma faced by Zachariah and Elizabeth, and why was human resolution to their problems impossible? vv. 5-7 They had no child, because that Elisabeth was barren, and they both were now well stricken in years.
4. In your own words, describe God's solution to their problem. vv. 11-17 God miraculously healed the womb of Elizabeth so that she gave birth in her old age, not unlike what God did for Sara the wife of Abraham. However, Johns had a more personal prophetic destiny. First, John was filled from the womb with the Holy Ghost, this was something Unheard of, he like Samson was not to touch strong drink but lived the life of a Nazarite. This would make Elizabeth the first adult filled with the Holy Ghost in years.
5. What was Zachariah's response to God's provision? vv. 18-20 Whereby shall I know this? for I am an old man, and my wife well stricken in years. For not believing he was stricken mute for a time.
6. Why was Mary chosen by God to be the mother of Jesus? vv. 28,30 Hail, thou that art highly favoured, the Lord is with thee: blessed art thou among women thou hast found favour with God.
7. Since what the angel told Mary was a human impossibility, she asked how it would be. What did the angel Gabriel say to her? v. 37 For with God nothing shall be impossible.
8. How did Mary's response to the angel's words contrast with Zachariah's response to the angel? vv. 18, 20, 38 Mary was full of faith and submission. She believed and was willing. Mary was a teenager at the time and the circumstances of life made things yet hopeful. Zachariah was old and had lived with much disapontment, He like so many of us used history to judge if what he heard was true or not, this was his source of disbelief.
9. What was Mary's response to Elizabeth's salutation? vv. 46,47 My soul doth magnify the Lord, And my spirit hath rejoiced in God my Saviour.
10. What was Zachariah's and Elizabeth's son called, and what was his ministry? 1:60,76,77; 3:16; John 1:23 John.. His prophetic call was, "he shall go before him in the spirit and power of Elias, to turn the hearts of the fathers to the children, and the disobedient to the wisdom of the just; to make ready a people prepared for the Lord." The voice of one crying in the wilderness, Make straight the way of the Lord, as said the prophet Esaias.

CHAPTER 2 - READ THE CHAPTER FIRST

Mary and Joseph lived in the town of Nazareth in Galilee when the time of Jesus' birth was about to be fulfilled. However, it had been prophesied that the Messiah would be born in Bethlehem. Read Micah 5:2.

1. What human event did God use in order to accomplish His purpose? v. 1 there went out a decree from Caesar Augustus that all the world should be taxed. Its amazing that God brought so much good out of a tax!

The trip for Mary and Joseph was very difficult and the timing seemed wrong. It would have been very easy to complain and question God. Their response could have been: "If we are chosen and highly favored, why is it so hard?" God even used an ungodly person like Caesar to accomplish His plan.

2. What confirmation did God give to Mary concerning her son Jesus? vv. 8-18,25-38 _____
 the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them---proclaiming Jesus Messiah's Birth.
 Simeon being full and lead of the Holy Ghost blessed them; Anna, a prophetess, the daughter of Phanuel also prophesied over Jesus.

When Jesus was 12 years old, Mary and Joseph went up to Jerusalem as was their custom in order to celebrate the Passover feast. (Read Deuteronomy 16:1-8 and Exodus 23:15.) After the celebration and it was time to return home, they traveled a whole day's journey before they realized that Jesus was missing. Also, it is easy for us believers today to become so involved in our own activity that we leave Jesus out of our lives. We suddenly come to the realization that the presence of Jesus is no longer with us as He once was. When this happens we must seek Him until His presence is once again with us.

3. When a similar condition was apparent in the church at Ephesus, what did Jesus instruct them to do? Rev. 2:2-5 _____
 Remember therefore from whence thou art fallen, and repent, and do the first works
4. When Mary and Joseph realized that Jesus was not with them, what did they do? v. 45 _____
 they turned back again to Jerusalem, seeking him.
5. How long did it take for them to find Him? v. 46 _____
 Three days

We must be diligent in our daily lives and always walk with Jesus in His presence. It always takes more effort to find His presence after we have left Him than it does to leave Him.

 The Holy Ghost Baptism is the Spirit of God upon you, confirmed by speaking in tongues initially then by other means, giving power from "on high" to be witnesses. Fire refers to zeal, a burning to know and follow Jesus' and Search the things of God.
5. How was king Herod affected by the preaching of John, and what was his reaction? vv. 19,20 _____
 Johns word reprovved him for being married to Herodias his brother Philip's wife, and for all the evils which Herod had done, Added yet this above all, that he shut up John in prison.
 The best and easiest way to respond to the conviction of the Holy Spirit is to repent and change one's attitude of heart and manner of living. However, convicted people often lash out against the person that God is using to witness to them. Therefore, a faithful witness for God should expect this and not be discouraged when it happens.

CHAPTER 4 - READ THE CHAPTER FIRST

The religious leaders of the synagogue of Nazareth honored the written law, but when Jesus applied the spirit of the law with the true interpretation, their religious spirit rejected Jesus the Messiah (the anointed one), the Living Word of God. The religious crowd at Capernaum was amazed at the teaching and authority of Jesus; they were very faithful in their observance of religious things no doubt.

7. However, when Jesus arrived and began to minister, what was manifested in the synagogue? vv. 33-35 a man, which had a spirit of an unclean devil, and cried out with a loud voice,

9. 4:38, 39 Jesus went to supper at Simon's house. When He got there he found Simon's mother in law was very sick and had a high fever. When the people asked him to heal her Jesus stood over her and rebuked the fever and it left. Being grateful she then got up and began to minister to him.
10. 4:40, 41 They brought all types of sick people to Jesus and He healed them all! Also many filled with devils and demons who when they seen it was Jesus cried out "you are the Christ the Son Of God". Jesus rebuked them and delivered the people that were so filled, telling the demons and devils not to speak because they knew who he was, the Christ.

6. The crowds of people kept coming to Jesus to hear Him and be healed by Him. In the midst of an exhausting time of ministry, where did Jesus go, and what did He do? v. 16 he withdrew himself into the wilderness, and prayed.

How often servants of the Lord suffer "burn out" for failing to do what Jesus did. The crowds no doubt would have liked for Jesus to continue ministering to them, but Jesus took the action that He needed.

7. As often is the case, true spiritual revival is opposed by religious leaders. What was the criticism of the Pharisees concerning Jesus' actions? vv. 20,21 cribes and the Pharisees began to reason, saying, Who is this which speaketh blasphemies? Who can forgive sins, but God alone?
8. What was the reason that Jesus gave to the Pharisees for healing the lame man? vv. 23,24 that ye may know that the Son of man hath power upon earth to forgive sins, (he said unto the sick of the palsy,) I say unto thee, Arise, and take up thy couch, and go into thine house.

9. What was the occupation of Levi (Matthew), and what was his response when he was called to follow Jesus? a publican, named Levi, sitting at the receipt of custom: and he said unto him, Follow me. And he left all, rose up, and followed him.
